

The latter categories of readers may send their communications to the Publicity Department, The Enfield Cycle Co. Ltd.












SWEDEN

52 Gold Watches and 288 Long Service Certificates since the inception of the Awards scheme in 1946.





The Banbury Run

Mr. R.A. Wilson-Jones, our Technical Manager, is a regular and enthusiastic competitor in the annual Banbury Run.

In 1953, out of a record entry of 250, he gained a First Class Award, together with a share in the Team Prize for machines manufactured not later than the end of 1914. Incidentally, awards have been very scarce- in 1951 only one First Class Award was made out of some 200 entries. Last year the 60 miles course started at Banbury, proceeding via Leamington to Baginton, near Coventry, this being the turning point.


All along the route great crowds had assembled, particularly at the top of Knowle, on the Edge Hill ridge, an obvious vantage point, where the congestion threatened to become serious. However, the able assistance given by the police prevented any mishaps.

In the Banbury Run there are two veteran classes, for machines built before the end of 1908 and 1914 respectively; dates of vintage models are 1923 and I930. Riders average 15, 20 or 24 m.p.h. according to choice.

Mr. G. D. Smith, M.A., B.Sc., A.M.I.E.E.

Mr. Gilbert Smith is the youngest son of Mr. R.W. Smith, the founder of the Enfield Cycle Company Limited.

He took an Honours Degree in Engineering at Cambridge University and a Mining Degree at Durham University. After working in the Durham coal mines for four years he spent fifteen years with Metropolitan-Vickers at Manchester, designing Automatic Electric Winding Engines, and became an Associate Member of the Institution of Electrical Engineers.

In 1941 he joined the Enfield Company as Works Engineer at Westwood in order to supervise the construction of the underground factory and the installation of the machinery. In addition he is now in charge of the Progress Department,

In his younger days he played Rugby Football for Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge, and rowed at Henley for them, and was also a good rifle shot. His recreations now are golf, carpentry and landscape gardening.

Mr. Bailey joined our London Depot in 1922, where he gained his early commercial training. In 1932, Mr. Bailey was transferred to our Gradual Payments Dept, at Redditch, but in 1937 he was back in London as Travelling Representative for Royal Enfield Cycles.

War Service intervened, but he was released from the R.A.F. to assist in the organisation of the Westwood Works for war production in 1942, and he has been there ever since, now occupying a managerial position.

In 1950 Mr. Bailey became a Member of the Purchasing Officers Association.

He is a keen voluntary worker, serving on the committees of various local organisations. His chief recreations are gardening and golf.


In the lower picture is an Enfield Single Cylinder Diesel Engine at work driving a 3-inch Auto Diesel Pump which is taking water from a low lying stream up

about twelve feet to a ditch behind the camera position.





His range of Royal Enfield machines includes two-strokes and the "350 Bullet" Scramble Model, the latter being particularly successful in local and international events organised in Algeria.






