At a special meeting, held recently, of the Ulster Centre of the Motor Cycle Union of Ireland a motion to alter Rule 25 in order to appoint more than one vice-president was defeated. Mr. J. K. Miller, of the Belfast and District Club, has been elected to the office.

B.M.C.R.C. Annual Meeting.

At the annual general meeting of the British Motor Cycle Racing Club, held on Monday, January 30th, at the Royal Automobile Club, London, Capt. O. M. Baldwin and Messrs. Percy Butler, H. W. Mathers and H. Le Vack were elected to the committee.

A proposal to use a longer circuit for the Grand Prix Race, to be held in July, was defeated, Professor A. M. Low speaking strongly in favour of the short course round the test hill.

Ethyl Not a Poison.

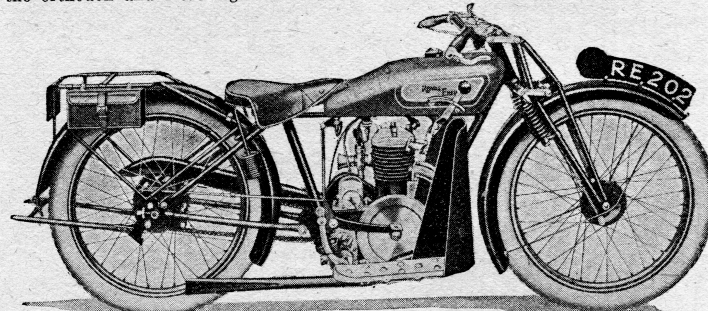
At a gathering held in London last week Dr. Kehoe, of Cincinnati, who has conducted the most exhaustive experiments in America in connection with the use of Ethyl petrol, made it abundantly clear that no danger exists in handling or using it or in overhauling engines which had run on it. Dr. Kehoe pointed out that Ethyl petrol has been used in the United States of America since 1923, and that last year the sales of it in that country exceeded the sales of all classes of motor spirit in the British Isles, and that not a single death or illness has occurred in connection with its handling, sales or distribution.
